Important News FALL MEETING Saturday September 22nd at 2PM Mike Lazich put together a skills survey for members to fill out so that we know what skills members have. We are looking to collect this data so that we can get your help or consultation on projects at the club. We know that

many of you are very talented and we would like to have a record of your individual talents if possible. So far we have had a poor response to the survey and ask that you fill out one of the questionnaires inserted in the TYC Rosters. There are skill survey sheets on top of the credenza under the Board of Directors photo board in the club. If you have not yet gotten your 2012 TYC Roster you may pick one up in the Steward's Shed.

Water Levels: Just to let you know, I have been on a committee supported by the Island Yacht Club, the Wilson Harbor Marina owners, and the Supervisor of the Town of Wilson that is working with Lisa Stephens, Commodore of the Wilson Yacht Club, to procure funding from either the State or the Federal government to get the harbor dredged. Currently we are in the preliminary stages of trying to get funding. We are working with the Corps of Engineers who have agreed to help provide sounding data, an estimate of the number of cubic yards of material that needs to be dredged from the harbor along with the approximate costs for the removal. Also they are providing historical data on the costs of sediment analysis for open lake dumping of dredged material and contractor costs for dredging. With this information provided by the Corps of Engineers along with economic data provided by the committee and other information, Lisa's group can better prepare a cost estimate that can be used to make a concerted effort to procure funding for a dredging effort in the harbor. More to follow.

The time is upon us to look for candidates to be voted on for the 2013 Board of Directors. I have appointed Nancy VanVoorhees as chair of the Election Committee. I would like each of you to consider serving TYC by putting your name in the hat as a candidate for the Board. > Did you know that the 'flagpole' of a yacht club is technically called a "mast" and represents the dry-land version of the mast of a sailing ship. Most yacht club masts come complete with a gaff, which is a spar running upwards at a forty-five degree angle from the "back" or landward side of the mast. Since it represents the gaff of a fully rigged ship, it is the place of honor even though its height is lower than the masthead. Accordingly, the rule is that on a mast with a gaff, the American Flag is flown from the gaff. If there is no gaff, the American Flag is flown from the next-highest place of honor, which is the masthead. A mast should be installed as if it is the mast of a ship putting out to sea; that is, the gaff should point aft, toward the land. If you stand at the base of the pole looking forward, the extremities of the yardarm are termed port (on your left) and starboard (on your right), just as they would be on a vessel. Ashore, the United States Ensign may be displayed at night only when illumined.

With Lake levels quickly dropping, the days getting shorter and the boating season coming to an end, I have the unfortunate duty to have to discuss this year's haul out schedule with you. This year the Board scheduled HAUL OUT activities for Columbus Day weekend at the beginning of October. As usual, this year we will be hauling boats Friday night, October 5th and Saturday,

October 6th and if necessary, Sunday October 7th. Hopefully, we will not have the extreme weather conditions we suffered through last year and have to extend the process into Monday.

There will be several activities that will occur prior to haul out, one of which will be CRADLE PLACEMENT that will take place Saturday and Sunday, September 22nd and 23rd. This event will be followed by mast un-stepping on Saturday September 29th.

As part of the planning process, please remember to renew all lift mark locations on your boat so they are visible from the deck, giving us exact locations for the slings to avoid having them landing on cradle pads. Also, please have control lines ready (minimum 50 feet on each end of the boat).

New members: Please let me know as soon as possible if you will be hauling and/or storing with us this year so I can arrange a space for your boat. If I don't hear from you, I will assume you have made other arrangements.

For those un-stepping masts with the boom truck or gin pole, please bring lots of bungee cords for securing all the shrouds and other rigging. These are not just to secure the equipment but to also control the loose items that can be hazardous to the crew. Make sure that your cradle has been inspected/repaired and leveled as necessary so that your boat sets in it safely. Also make sure that your pads are in good shape and that you have enough blocks and shim material available when your boat is placed in the cradle so as not to delay the haul out crew and crane operations.

We will start HAUL OUT with the powerboats stored along the channel on the south side of the island near I-94 Friday night. We will then move to the island parking lot and, if time permits, haul a few boats along the driveway (west side) as far as the crane can reach on the first set. The boat owners for these areas should be on site at 4:00 p.m. Friday night, and we will go as far as we can till dark. We will continue operations promptly at 7:00 am. Saturday morning. All boat owners on the west side driveway and the North end wall to I-40 need to be there at 7:00 a.m. to get hauled and assist around the club until we get to your boat. Boats from I-41 and higher please be there by 10:00 a.m. to get hauled and assist around the club until we get to your boat. Sunday morning we will start again at 7:00 a.m. for the rest of the boats that did not get hauled in the previous two days.

Exact haul out times are difficult to predict. Come early and enjoy the day. It is your responsibility to be there when it is your turn to be hauled. If we miss your boat because you were not there and we have moved on, it will be your responsibility to make arrangements to get your boat hauled. Waiting and/ or returning for owners not present is very expensive, so make sure you are there when it is your time to be hauled. Also if you know that you are not going to be there and you are authorizing someone else to act on your behalf, we will need a letter of proxy stating who will be in charge of your boat during the haul out. This letter must be E-mailed or sent to the Fleet Captain at least one week prior to haul out. If you have any questions, please feel free to call me.

For all of the mast, cradle, and haul out events, I will have work crew sign-up sheets posted in the clubhouse for you to volunteer for the various work crews. Please remember, this is a working club and participation by the membership is essential to its successful operation. We had sparse participation during the spring launch (especially after lunch), which made the work that much harder for the members that were still there. If you need work hours, this is a great way to get them, and even if you don't need them, it's a great way to help out the club.

For safety reasons, no children are to be around the work areas on the Island during cradle movement and haul out weekends. No children will be permitted to ride or operate any equipment or be left unattended—your cooperation is greatly appreciated.
